

Instructions:

- Pick up all the trash and record all items you find. Keep track of the items by making tick marks (444 II). Only numbers are useful, avoid using words or check marks.

- If you can tell where a fragment is from, record it as that item (e.g., Record a foam piece clearly from a cup, as a cup.)
- Lobster traps and buoys are the private property of the fisherman and we are NOT allowed to remove them. Please tally these items, although you are not removing them.

- Don't pick up dead animals or anything hazardous. Bring these items to the attention of a BOS staff member.

- If you see a marine mammal (e.g. a seal), tell BOS staff or call the local marine mammal hotline (1-800-532-9551 in ME, 603-997-9448 in NH).





- Built up an e-mail list


Now... lots of inquiries

- Trash is still out there... every day




