NH Screenings

Goal was to generate awareness about PFAS contamination and advocate for stricter water quality standards than those drafted by NHDES.

- Shown in 20 cities and towns
- Seen by approx. 800 people
- Generated 1100 petition signatures to NHDES
- Generated dozens of letters to local elected officials
